

Witch Hazel (Hamamelis) Member of the Family Hamamelidacaea, Which includes many common landscape plants:












Hamamelis virginiana

 Multi-stem small tree/large shrub 15-30′
 Native Canada to Georgia, west to
 Nebraska and Arkansas
 Flowers ½-1″ yellow, sometimes reddish,
 October–December, mild fragrance, may
 be hidden by leaves
 Used as understock for grafting all
 selections.
 Commercial source for liniment.




































































Things to consider.....

- cuttings taken from young cuttinggrown plants should have enhanced juvenility and root better than from mature plants
- Plants on their own roots could be used to establish stool beds
- Using roots from own-root plants, graft the same plant onto itself
- Use bare root understock, graft below the hypocotyl to reduce sucker production
































